A WORD FROM THE CEO

Dear Subscribers, Ladies and Gentlemen,

When we opened our 127th season last autumn, we had many reasons to be joyful and optimistic. Semyon Bychkov, just announced as Conductor of the Year by the magazine *Musical America*, extended his contract with the Czech Philharmonic until the year 2028, thereby fulfilling a precondition for the orchestra's further artistic development. Our principal guest conductor Jakub Hrůša has accepted the position of music director of London's Royal Opera, greatly enhancing the reputation of the Czech Republic in the world of culture. The Pentatone label released the orchestra's highly acclaimed recording of Mahler's Fifth Symphony, and there was also an extraordinarily successful European tour.

In order to maintain the favour of our audience, for the 128th season we have again invited illustrious artists. Besides our in-house conductors Semyon Bychkov, Jakub Hrůša, and Tomáš Netopil, returning to the orchestra will be Simon Rattle, and Giovanni Antonini, while Antonio Pappano and Tugan Sokhiev will be making their debuts. Once again, we will welcome such soloists as Yuja Wang, Janine Jansen, and András Schiff from abroad as well as Czech artists including Josef Špaček and Lukáš Vondráček. While we will continue to realise our Mahler CD cycle with Semyon Bychkov, we will also be recording Antonín Dvořák's last three symphonies with

him, and we will be representing our country on tour in Europe and Asia with all-Dvořák programmes.

None of these activities would have been possible without the strong, long-term support of the Czech Ministry of Culture and of our many partners. Among them, I would like to point out in particular the ČEZ Group, which has signed a general partnership agreement with us for another three years, the PPF Group, which has joined us recently, and our traditional partners the bank Česká spořitelna and Škoda Auto, with which we will be opening our 30th season together this autumn. The Progresus investment group has become an important partner for supporting young talents. All of them deserve our appreciation, as do other donors who belong to the Dynamic Club of the Czech Philharmonic in constantly increasing numbers.

Ladies and gentlemen, we wish you a season full of beautiful artistic experiences and lovely gatherings at the Rudolfinum. We look forward to seeing you!

On 4 January 1896, the 128-year-old Czech Philharmonic gave its first concert in the famed Rudolfinum Hall in the heart of Prague. Conducted by Antonín Dvořák, the programme featured the world première of his Biblical Songs, Nos. 1–5. Renowned for its definitive interpretations of the Czech repertoire, the Orchestra also has a

special relationship to the music of Brahms and Tchaikovsky – both friends of Dvořák – and to Mahler who in 1908 conducted the Orchestra in the world première of his Symphony No. 7.

As festivals, orchestras and presenters across the Czech Republic gear up to celebrate the Year of Czech Music in 2024, the Czech Philharmonic’s 128th season launches in September with a series of concerts dedicated to Dvořák led by Chief Conductor and Music Director Semyon Bychkov. As well as the concerts in Prague, Bychkov and the Orchestra will take Dvořák to South Korea and Japan in the autumn, and to the major European capitals including Madrid, Vienna and Paris in the spring. Following the success of Bychkov’s concert performances of Rusalka at the 2022 Dvořák Prague International Festival, the Orchestra’s Principal Guest Conductors Jakub Hrůša and Tomáš Netopil will lead performances of Martinů’s Ariadne and Smetana’s Libuše. Libuše is presented in collaboration with the Prague Spring International Music Festival and Smetana’s Litomyšl Festival as part of Smetana’s bi-centenary celebrations.

This season marks the beginning of Semyon Bychkov’s second 5-year term as Chief Conductor and Music Director. The focus at the time of his appointment was on Tchaikovsky’s symphonic works which culminated in The Tchaikovsky Project – a series of concerts, residencies and

recordings for Decca Classics. More recently the focus has turned to Mahler and, a new complete symphonic cycle Pentatone. The first of the cycle, Mahler’s Symphony No. 4 was released in April 2022, followed by the release of the Fifth and Second Symphonies. During the 128th season, Bychkov will conduct the Czech Philharmonic in performances of the Third Symphony in Prague and Baden-Baden, prior to recordings for Czech Phil media.

Over the three years since its launch in 2020, the Czech Philharmonic’s annual concert honouring the Velvet Revolution of 17 November 1989 has been conducted by Bychkov, Hrůša and Sir Simon Rattle. This November, the Orchestra has invited Sir Antonio Pappano, making his Czech Philharmonic debut, to conduct Janine Jansen in Mendelssohn’s Violin Concerto and Dvořák’s Slavonic Dances. Former Artists-in-Residence Yuja Wang (2021/2022) and Sir Simon Rattle (2022/2023) return later in the season with music by Rachmaninoff and Bruckner; and this season’s Artist-in-Residence, Sir Andrés Schiff, will perform at home and on tour with the Orchestra, and as a guest of the 2023 Dvořák Prague International Festival.

The Czech Philharmonic’s extraordinary and proud history reflects both its location at the very heart of Europe and the Czech Republic’s turbulent political history, for which Smetana’s

My Country has become a potent symbol. The Orchestra gave its first full rendition of My Country in a brewery in Smíchov in 1901; in 1925 under Chief Conductor Václav Talich, My Country was the Orchestra’s first live broadcast and, five years later, it was the first work that the Orchestra committed to disc. During the Nazi occupation, when Goebbels demanded that the Orchestra perform in Berlin and Dresden, Talich programmed My Country as an act of defiance, while in 1945 Rafael Kubelík conducted the work as a ‘concert of thanks’ for the newly liberated Czechoslovakia. In 1990, My Country was Kubelík’s choice to mark Czechoslovakia’s first free elections, a historic event which was recognised 30 years later when Bychkov chose the occasion of the first Velvet Revolution concert to perform the complete cycle at the Rudolfinum.

Throughout the Czech Philharmonic’s history, two features have remained at its core: its championing of Czech composers and its belief in music’s power to change lives. Defined from its inauguration as an organisation for the enhancement of musical art in Prague, and a pension organisation for the members of the National Theatre Orchestra in Prague, its widows and orphans, the proceeds from the four concerts that it performed each year helped to support members of the orchestra who could no longer play and the immediate family of deceased musicians. As early as the 1920’s, Václav

Talich (Chief Conductor 1919–1941) pioneered concerts for workers, young people and other voluntary organisations including the Red Cross, the Czechoslovak Sokol and the Union of Slavic Women and, in 1923 gave three benefit concerts for Russian, Austrian and German players including members of the Vienna and Berlin Philharmonic Orchestras.

The philosophy is equally vibrant today. Alongside the Czech Philharmonic Youth Orchestra, Orchestral Academy and Jiří Bělohlávek Prize for young musicians, a comprehensive education strategy engages with more than 400 schools enabling all ages to visit the Rudolfinum – some travelling as many as four hours – to hear concerts and participate in masterclasses. An inspirational music and song programme led by singer Ida Kellarová for the extensive Romany communities within the Czech Republic and Slovakia has helped many socially excluded families to find a voice. In addition to its annual education exchange with the Royal Academy of Music in London, last year at the invitation of the Czech Philharmonic, Alfred Brendel and Boris Giltburg gave masterclasses and lectures to launch the Ivan Moravec Academy in honour of the Czech pianist and teacher (1930–2015).

An early champion of Martinů's music, the Czech Philharmonic premièred his Czech Rhapsody in 1919 and, its detailed inventory of Czech music, undertaken by Václav Talich included the world premières of Martinů's Half Time (1924), Janáček's Sinfonietta (1926) and the Prague premièred of Janáček's Taras Bulba (1924). Rafael Kubelík was also an advocate of Martinů's music and premièred Field Mass (1946) and Symphony

No. 5 (1947), while Karel Ančerl conducted the premièred of Martinů's Symphony No. 6 Fantaisies symphoniques (1956). Fantaisies symphoniques has also featured twice in the Orchestra's programmes at the BBC Proms, first in 1969 under Chief Conductor Václav Neumann and again in 2010 under Sir John Eliot Gardiner.

Prague has long been favoured by composers, not least Mozart who, following performances of *Le Nozze di Figaro* and *Don Giovanni* in Prague, from Vienna to premièred *La Clemenza di Tito* in 1791. Five years later, Beethoven made two trips to Prague, returning in 1798 to give the premièred of his Piano Concerto No. 1. His Seventh Symphony was composed in the spa town of Teplitz (now Teplice). Mahler's ties ran even deeper. Born in the Bohemian village of Kaliště, now part of the Czech Republic, Mahler was 23 when he conducted at the Royal Municipal Theatre in Moravia and first travelled to Prague to conduct at the Neues Deutsches Theatre before returning to give the world premièred of his Symphony No. 7 with the Czech Philharmonic in 1908.

Mahler, however, was not the first composer of renown to conduct the Czech Philharmonic. Edward Grieg conducted the Orchestra in 1906; Stravinsky performed his *Capriccio for Piano and Orchestra* under Václav Talich in 1930; Leonard Bernstein conducted the European premièred of Aaron Copland's Symphony No. 3 at the Prague Spring in 1947; Arthur Honegger conducted a concert of his own music in 1949; Darius Milhaud gave the premièred of his *Music for Prague* at the Prague Spring Festival in 1966; and, in 1996, Krzysztof Penderecki conducted the premièred of his *Concerto for Clarinet and Chamber Orchestra*.

Their names are joined by the many luminaries who have collaborated with the Orchestra over the years: Martha Argerich, Claudio Arrau, Evgeny Kissin, Erich Kleiber, Leonid Kogan, Erich Leinsdorf, Lovro von Matačić, Ivan Moravec, Yevgeny Mravinsky, David Oistrakh, Antonio Pedrotti, Sviatoslav Richter, Mstislav Rostropovich, Gennady Rozhdestvensky, Wolfgang Sawallisch, Wolfgang Schneiderhan, George Szell, Henryk Szeryng, Bruno Walter and Alexander Zemlinsky.

SEMYON BYCHKOV

Chief Conductor and Music Director of the Czech Philharmonic

“The quality of technical realization is indispensable during the time of preparation. Now at the beginning of a new 5-year contract as Chief Conductor and Music Director of the Czech Philharmonic, Semyon Bychkov's relationship with the Orchestra has become noticeably deeper with extraordinary performances of the great Czech masters running in parallel with a much-acclaimed Mahler cycle recorded for Pentatone, and memorable performances of Rachmaninoff, Shostakovich, Strauss, Schumann, and Beethoven.

Bychkov's inaugural season with the Czech Philharmonic in 2018 was celebrated with an international tour that took the Orchestra from

performances at home in Prague to concerts in London, New York, and Washington. Dvořák is a major focus throughout the 128th season – in addition to being featured in the season launch and the opening subscription concerts, Bychkov and the Czech Philharmonic take Dvořák to audiences in South Korea and Japan, reprising the East Asia tour originally planned for 2020. Later in the season, the Orchestra will bring Dvořák to the major European capitals in celebration of 2024's Year of Czech Music.

For the past three seasons, Bychkov's work with the Czech Philharmonic has focused on the music of Gustav Mahler, with performances of the symphonies at the Rudolfinum, on tour and ultimately committed to disc. Pentatone's Mahler Cycle launched in spring 2022 with the release of Mahler's Symphony No. 4, followed by recordings of Mahler's Symphony No. 5 in October and, most recently Symphony No. 2. This season Mahler's Symphony No. 3 will be performed at the Rudolfinum and in Baden-Baden.

Other major projects during Bychkov's tenure include the commissioning of 14 new works – nine from Czech composers and five commissions from international composers. The symphonies of Detlev Glanert and Julian Anderson were both inspired and named after Prague, Bryce Dessner composed a tone poem inspired by the nature of the Basque Coast where Bychkov



lives, and Thierry Escaich and Thomas Larcher composed piano concertos. Bychkov's first major initiative with the Czech Philharmonic was The Tchaikovsky Project – a 7-CD box set devoted to Tchaikovsky's symphonic repertoire released by Decca and a series of international residencies. Last September, after giving the official concert to mark the Czech Republic's Presidency of the EU, Bychkov and the Orchestra started the season as guests of the Dvořák Prague International Music Festival, where they gave three concert performances of Dvořák's *Rusalka*.

In common with the Czech Philharmonic, Bychkov has one foot firmly in the culture of the East and the other in the West. Born in Leningrad 1952, Bychkov emigrated to the United States in 1975 and has lived in Europe since the mid-1980's. Singled out for an extraordinarily privileged musical education from the age of 5, Bychkov studied piano before winning his place at the Glinka Choir School where, aged 13, he received his first lesson in conducting. He was 17 when he was accepted at the Leningrad Conservatory to study with the legendary Ilya Musin and, within three years had won the influential Rachmaninoff Conducting Competition. He left the former Soviet Union in 1975, having been denied his prize of conducting the Leningrad Philharmonic.

By the time Bychkov returned to Leningrad in 1989 as the Philharmonic's Principal Guest Conductor, he had enjoyed success in the US as Music Director of the Grand Rapids Symphony Orchestra and the Buffalo Philharmonic. His international career, which began in France with Opéra de Lyon and at the Aix-en-Provence

Festival, took off with a series of high-profile cancellations which resulted in invitations to conduct the New York and Berlin Philharmonic Orchestras and the Concertgebouworkest. In 1989, he was named Music Director of the Orchestre de Paris; in 1997, Chief Conductor of the WDR Symphony Orchestra Cologne; and the following year, Chief Conductor of the Dresden Semperoper.

Bychkov's symphonic and operatic repertoire is wide-ranging. He conducts in all the major opera houses including La Scala, Opéra national de Paris, Dresden Semperoper, Wiener Staatsoper, New York's Metropolitan Opera, the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden and Teatro Real. While Principal Guest Conductor of Maggio Musicale Fiorentino, his productions of Janáček's *Jenůfa*, Schubert's *Fierrabras*, Puccini's *La bohème*, Shostakovich's *Lady Macbeth of Mtsensk* and Mussorgsky's *Boris Godunov* each won the prestigious Premio Abbiati. New productions in Vienna have included Strauss' *Der Rosenkavalier* and *Daphne*, Wagner's *Lohengrin* and *Parsifal*, and Mussorgsky's *Khovanshchina*; while in London, he made his operatic debut with a new production of Strauss' *Elektra*, and subsequently conducted new productions of Mozart's *Così fan tutte*, Strauss' *Die Frau ohne Schatten* and Wagner's *Tannhäuser*. Recent productions include Strauss' *Elektra* at the Paris Opera, Dvořák's *Rusalka* at Covent Garden and Wagner's *Tristan and Isolde* at Teatro Real in Madrid.

On the concert platform, the combination of innate musicality and rigorous Russian pedagogy has ensured that Bychkov's performances are highly anticipated. In the UK, in addition

to regular performances with the London Symphony Orchestra, his honorary titles at the Royal Academy of Music and the BBC Symphony Orchestra – with whom he appears annually at the BBC Proms – reflect the warmth of the relationships. In Europe, he tours with the Concertgebouworkest and Munich Philharmonic, as well as being a frequent guest of the Vienna and Berlin Philharmonics, the Leipzig Gewandhaus, the Orchestre National de France and the Accademia Nazionale di Santa Cecilia; in the US, he can be heard with the New York Philharmonic, Chicago Symphony, Los Angeles Symphony, Philadelphia and Cleveland Orchestras.

Bychkov made extensive recordings for Philips with the Berlin Philharmonic, Bavarian Radio, Concertgebouworkest, Philharmonia, London Philharmonic and Orchestre de Paris. His 13-year collaboration (1997–2010) with WDR Symphony Orchestra Cologne produced a series of benchmark recordings that included works by Strauss (*Elektra*, *Daphne*, *Ein Heldenleben*, *Metamorphosen*, *Alpensinfonie*, *Till Eulenspiegel*), Mahler (*Symphony No. 3*, *Das Lied von der Erde*), Shostakovich (*Symphony Nos. 4, 7, 8, 10, 11*), Rachmaninoff (*The Bells*, *Symphonic Dances*, *Symphony No. 2*), Verdi (*Requiem*), a complete cycle of Brahms Symphonies, and works by Detlev Glanert and York Höller. His recording of Tchaikovsky's *Eugene Onegin* was recommended by BBC's *Radio 3's Building a Library* (2020); Wagner's *Lohengrin* was BBC Music Magazine's *Record of the Year* (2010); and Schmidt's *Symphony No. 2* with the Vienna Philharmonic was BBC Music Magazine's *Record of the Month* (2018). Of The Tchaikovsky Project released in 2019, BBC Music Magazine

wrote: "The most beautiful orchestra playing imaginable can be heard on Semyon Bychkov's 2017 recording with the Czech Philharmonic, in which Decca's state-of-the-art recording captures every detail."

Bychkov was the first musician to express his position on the outbreak of the war in Ukraine, since when he has spoken in support of Ukraine in Prague's Wenceslas Square; on radio and television in the Czech Republic, France, Germany, Austria, the UK and the USA; written *By Invitation for The Economist*; and appeared as a guest on BBC World's *HARDtalk*.

In October 2022, Semyon Bychkov was named Musical America's *Conductor of the Year* Worldwide. Earlier in the year he received an Honorary Doctorate from the Royal Academy of Music and, in 2015 he was named *Conductor of the Year* by the International Opera Awards.

JAKUB HRŮŠA

Principal Guest Conductor

Born in the Czech Republic, Jakub Hrůša is Chief Conductor of the Bamberg Symphony, Music Director Designate of The Royal Opera, Covent Garden (Music Director from 2025), Principal Guest Conductor of the Czech Philharmonic, and Principal Guest Conductor of the Orchestra dell'Accademia Nazionale di Santa Cecilia.

He is a frequent guest with the world's greatest orchestras, including the Vienna, Berlin, Munich and New York Philharmonics; Bavarian Radio Symphony, NHK, Chicago and Boston Symphonies; Staatskapelle Dresden, Orchestre de Paris; Leipzig Gewandhaus, Royal Concertgebouw, Mahler Chamber and The Cleveland Orchestras. He has led opera productions for the Salzburg Festival (Káťa Kabanová with the Vienna Philharmonic in 2022), Vienna State Opera, Royal Opera House, and Opéra National de Paris. He has also been a regular guest with Glyndebourne Festival and served as Music Director of Glyndebourne On Tour for three years.

His relationships with leading vocal and instrumental soloists have included collaborations in recent seasons with Daniil Trifonov, Mitsuko Uchida, Hélène Grimaud, Behzod Abduraimov, Anne Sofie Mutter, Lisa Batiashvili, Joshua Bell, Yefim Bronfman, Rudolf Buchbinder, Gautier Capuçon, Julia Fischer, Sol Gabetta, Hilary Hahn, Janine Jansen and others.

As a recording artist, Jakub Hrůša has received numerous awards and nominations for his discography. Most recently, he received the Opus Klassik Conductor of the Year nomination and the ICMA prize for his recording of Bruckner's Symphony No. 4, and the Preis der Deutschen Schallplattenkritik for his recording of Mahler's Symphony No. 4, both with Bamberg Symphony. In 2021, his disc of Martinů and Bartók violin concertos with Bamberg Symphony and Frank Peter Zimmermann was nominated for BBC Music Magazine and Gramophone awards, and his recording of the Dvořák Violin Concerto with the Bavarian Radio Symphony and Augustin Hadelich was nominated for a Grammy Award.

Jakub Hrůša studied at the Academy of Performing Arts in Prague, where his teachers included Jiří Bělohlávek. He is President of the International Martinů Circle and The Dvořák Society. He was the inaugural recipient of the Sir Charles Mackerras Prize, and in 2020 was awarded both the Antonín Dvořák Prize by the Czech Republic's Academy of Classical Music, and – together with Bamberg Symphony – the Bavarian State Prize for Music.



TOMÁŠ NETOPIĽ

Principal Guest Conductor

An inspirational force in Czech music, Tomáš Netopil holds the position of Principal Guest Conductor of the Czech Philharmonic. In early Spring 2018 he led the orchestra on an extensive UK tour, and conducted *My Country* in the opening concert of the 2018 Prague Spring Festival, which was televised live. In the 2020/2021 season, his engagements with them included conducting at the Smetana's Litomyšl Festival in June 2021.

Tomáš Netopil celebrated his tenth and final season as General Music Director of the Aalto Musiktheater and Philharmonie Essen in 2022/2023. This season featured Wagner's *Tannhäuser*, Kampe's *Dogville* and Mozart's *Le Nozze di Figaro* and also a production of Janáček's *Káťa Kabanová* at Grand Théâtre de Genève.

In Summer 2018 Tomáš Netopil created the International Summer Music Academy in Kroměříž offering students both exceptional artistic tuition and the opportunity to meet and work with major international musicians. In Summer 2021, in association with the Dvořák Prague Festival, the Academy established the Dvořákova Praha Youth Philharmonic with musicians from conservatories and music academies, coached by principal players of the Czech Philharmonic Orchestra.

Operatic highlights beyond Essen include Sächsische Staatsoper Dresden (*La clemenza di Tito*, *Rusalka*, *The Cunning Little Vixen*, *La Juive*, *The Bartered Bride*, and Busoni's *Doktor Faust*), Vienna Staatsoper (his most recent successes include *Idomeneo*, *Der Freischütz*, and a new production of *Leonore*) and for Netherlands Opera (*Jenůfa*). His concert highlights of recent seasons have included Tonhalle-Orchester Zürich as well as engagements with Orchestre de Paris, London Philharmonic Orchestra, Netherlands Radio Philharmonic Orchestra at the Amsterdam Concertgebouw and Orchestra Sinfonica della RAI.

Tomáš Netopil's discography for Supraphon includes Janáček's *Glagolitic Mass* (the first ever recording of the original 1927 version), Dvořák's complete cello works, Martinů's *Ariane* and *Double Concerto*, and Smetana's *My Country* with the Prague Symphony Orchestra. During his tenure in Essen, he has recorded Suk *Asrael* and Mahler Symphonies No. 6 and 9.

He studied violin and conducting in his native Czech Republic, as well as at the Royal College of Music in Stockholm under the guidance of Professor Jorma Panula. In 2002 he won the 1st Sir Georg Solti Conductors Competition at the Alte Oper Frankfurt.

ARTIST-IN-RESIDENCE FOR THE 128th SEASON OF THE CP

András Schiff *piano*

We began the tradition of artists-in-residence in our 126th season, and this time we are going back to having a pianist by inviting Sir András Schiff, a world-famous British artist of Hungarian origin. The bulk of his repertoire consists of Baroque, Classical, and Romantic works, but he also devotes himself to music of the 20th and 21st centuries. He first appeared with the Czech Philharmonic in 1984 on an American tour, but his present engagement is his first here in a very long time.

During a season-long residency, closer ties and more intensive collaboration with selected artist bring significant enrichment to the Czech Philharmonic. Artists-in-residence appear repeatedly during the season in a variety of formats and in diverse repertoire. We will see András Schiff with the Czech Philharmonic in a dual role as pianist and conductor at the Dvořák Prague International Music Festival, in October at subscription concerts with chief conductor Semyon Bychkov, and in February with the Czech Philharmonic Chamber Orchestra as part of the Czech Chamber Music Society's season. Then in March he will join the Czech Philharmonic for concerts in Vienna, Hamburg, and Munich as part of the orchestra's European tour.

Sir András Schiff is acclaimed around the world as a pianist, conductor, pedagogue, and instructor. He inspires both audiences and critics, bringing mastery and intellectual insight to his interpretations. He was born in Budapest in 1953 and studied piano there at the Franz Liszt Academy under Pál Kadosa, György Kurtág, and Ferenc Rados and in London under George Malcom. His complete performances of the Beethoven sonatas and of the works of Johann Sebastian Bach, Joseph Haydn, Franz Schubert, and Béla Bartók have been an important part of his performing career.

He has collaborated with the world's top orchestras, but he is now focusing mainly on solo recitals, conducting at the piano, and unique conducting projects. His Bach concerts have become a yearly highlight at the BBC Proms, and he also appears regularly at the festivals in Verbier, Salzburg, and Baden-Baden as well as at London's Wigmore Hall. For the 2022/2023 season, he was the artist-in-residence of the New York Philharmonic.

Vicenza is the home of Cappella Andrea Barca – Schiff's own chamber orchestra consisting of international soloists, chamber players, and friends, which he founded in 1999. With them, he has appeared at Carnegie Hall, the Lucerne Festival, and the Mozartwoche in Salzburg, and there is a coming concert tour of Asia and

a European series of Bach piano concerts. The orchestra is the curator of the festival at the Teatro Olimpico in Vicenza.

Sir András has close ties to the Chamber Orchestra of Europe, the Budapest Festival Orchestra, and the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment, with which he accepted the role of Associated Artist in 2018, affirming his interest in playing period keyboard instruments.

He continues to support new talent, especially through the series Building Bridges, which arranges performances for talented young artists. He also teaches at the Barenboim-Said Academy and in Kronberg, and he gives frequent lectures and masterclasses. In 2017, Bärenreiter published his book *Music Comes Out of Silence*, with essays and interviews with Martin Meyer.

Sir András Schiff has received many honours including a Gold Medal from the International Mozarteum Foundation (2012), Germany's Great Cross with Star of the Order of Merit (2012), the Royal Philharmonic Society Gold Medal (2013), British knighthood for service to music (2014), and an honorary doctorate from the Royal College of Music (2018). The Henry and Leigh Bienen School of Music at Northwestern University honoured him with the 2021 Jean Gimbel Lane Prize in Piano Performance.

EDUCATION PROGRAMMES

E



Education has been part of the Czech Philharmonic's mission since its founding. In the orchestra's oldest charter, we read that it was established for the exaltation of the art of music. Václav Talich took an important step in the 1920s when he decided that the Czech Philharmonic would give concerts for children and young people as well as for labourers. Talich also inspired the creation of the programme Musical Youth, which the Czech Philharmonic took under its wing for some time in the late 1960s. The 1970s and 1980s brought the music popularisation series "The Czech Philharmonic Plays and Talks" with Václav Neumann, followed by the concerts "Czech Philharmonic for Youth". Today we are trying to build upon that beautiful tradition. Our educational programmes have one common goal: to awaken, develop, and deepen our relationship with music, enabling us to experience joy and a feeling of connectedness with others.



Dear Friends,

Today, educational programmes are integral to the Czech Philharmonic's mission. In the orchestra's charter, we read that it was established for the exaltation of the art of music. And we are trying with all of our might to continue and maintain the orchestra's historical ethos. For all of their diversity, our educational programmes have one goal in common: to awaken, develop, and deepen our relationship with music, enabling us to experience joy and a feeling of connectedness with others.

Many of our programmes are for schools at all levels, from preschool to primary and secondary schools. In this way, we are trying to support the music education of pupils and students, and we are pleased that we are also able to think things over with the teachers themselves at regular meetings. We are glad that our programmes also reach out to families across generations. There is nothing more beautiful than a gathering of children, parents, grandparents...

We devote special care to the young musicians who constitute the Czech Philharmonic Youth Orchestra. We give them the chance to rehearse regularly and to perform great works of the worldwide repertoire of symphonic works, concertos, and vocal-instrumental music. We are trying to build a permanent orchestra from these musicians, allowing long-term relationships and understanding to develop among them. "You can put anything in front of them and they will play it", said Sir Simon Rattle, characterising the young musicians he was working with in June 2020. At present, the orchestra is participating

in subscription concerts of the Czech Philharmonic with the conductors Semyon Bychkov, Giovanni Antonini, and Jakub Hrůša. In addition, they have their own series of concerts with commentary with Marko Ivanović; for listeners abroad, recordings of many of these concerts can be found on YouTube.

We have now been working for 10 years on the project *Romano Drom* with the singer and choir-master Ida Kellarová and the choir *Čhavorengé*. The purpose of the project is to support the young generation of Romani. So far, our joint efforts have resulted in a hundred concerts in the Czech Republic, Slovakia, and the United Kingdom, but most important is the impact on the lives of many Romani children and young people who discover a relationship with their own culture, experience the feeling of true confidence, and discover ways of life that differ from those laid before them so often by negative external circumstances. James Naughtie commented on the project for the BBC Music Magazine: "The Czech Philharmonic's involvement is a fine example of what can be done. Many orchestras have taken steps in the right direction – Simon Rattle took the Berlin Philharmonic to perform in some of the roughest parts of that city – but this one has a particular character and relevance. At a time of rampant nationalism in Eastern Europe, the outsider is always going to suffer. It is nothing new for Roma communities to have to accept that they are going to be denied respect and perhaps face direct discrimination. In that atmosphere, the statement by the Czech Philharmonic is brave and significant."

Thirdly, members of the Czech Philharmonic Youth Orchestra will appear not only at subscription concerts (with the conductors Giovanni Antonini and Jakub Hrůša, see pages 33 and 44), but also in the series Steps to the New World under the baton of Marko Ivanović. As a chamber music counterpart to the Steps series, we are offering concerts with commentary with Jana Boušková, Josef Špaček, Miroslav Sekera, and others... and with the music of Bedřich Smetana – the 200th anniversary of his birth arrives in 2024!

MUSICAL GATHERINGS AND WORKSHOPS

We offer a wide range of unusual musical encounters. In the year of the Smetana Jubilee, don't miss the ball with Smetana, which will be preceded by dance courses. Commemorating a serious and difficult part of our past is the story of the Catholic priest Josef Toufar set to music by Slavomír Hořínka and titled "My Uncle Vanished. Where Did He Go, Mr. President?" You can immerse yourself in the depths of musical interpretation at a gathering with the legendary pianist Alfred Brendel for his masterclass under the auspices of the Ivan Moravec Academy. We mainly invite the elderly to the musical workshops "Musica ludus", where anyone who is interested will be at home regardless of musical ability and experience. The cycle "100 Minutes among the Notes" and its highpoint "Holiday among the Notes" represent the joint discovery and playing of music and an intergenerational encounter.

100 MINUTES AMONG THE NOTES AND HOLIDAY AMONG THE NOTES

Age doesn't matter. Bringing different generations together is beautiful, powerful, and special. Just like the harmonious world of music, which we can create together. The performers are Ondřej Tichý and his guests.

MUSICA LUDUS

At these gatherings of the elderly (and others), the emphasis is on the shared experience of listening, movement, and the playing of simple musical instruments. Providing the accompaniment are Rafaela Drgáčová, Hana Novotná, and Ondřej Tichý.

CZECH BALL (NOT ONLY) WITH BEDŘICH SMETANA AND DANCE COURSES WITH SMETANA

An evening at the Rudolfinum, where you will enjoy the rustling of hoop skirts, the whirling of fans, and colourful folk costumes from every corner of our country. For those who are interested, there are dance lessons at the Rudolfinum. Pairs are welcome, but you can also come alone. The performers are Kateřina Klementová and the Bedřich Smetana Dance Band.

ALFRED BRENDEL AND BORIS GILTBURG ON BEETHOVEN'S LATE PIANO AND CHAMBER WORKS

One of the greatest pianists of the 20th and 21st centuries, Alfred Brendel is still active at 93 years of age and devotes himself to both music and literature as well as to writing essays and painting. He will be the guide for young musicians in the world of Franz Schubert's chamber music.

Boris Gilburg's victory at the 2013 Queen Elisabeth Competition in Brussels helped launch his remarkable musical career. In Prague, he will devote himself to Beethoven and will lead a masterclass with young pianists.

The programme is being realised in cooperation with the Prague Music Performance.

MY UNCLE VANISHED. WHERE DID HE GO, MR. PRESIDENT? THE STORY OF JOSEF TOUFAR.

This true story recalls the fateful events of 1949–1950 and the drama of the last days of the priest Josef Toufar. Musicians of the Czech Philharmonic and actors from the Disman Radio Children's Ensemble bring a script by Jana Franková to life.

PROGRAMMES FOR (YOUNGER) CHILDREN WITH PARENTS

For many years we have been preparing programmes for the youngest children from preschools as part of the series The Little Rudolfinum, in which various musical secrets are revealed as our instructors introduce children to musicians and their instruments. In our 128th season, thanks to our new EDUcentre facilities, we are offering The Little Rudolfinum for parents with children as well. The musical storytelling programmes “The Emperor’s Nightingale” or “A Visit to the Court of the Emperor of China” and “A Little Train Ride with Dvořák” will be continuing. We are very glad that a new programme is being prepared by the director Alice Nellis together with the actress Martha Isoová and the member of the Czech Philharmonic Vojtěch Jouza, the leader of Prague Baroque Ensemble.

THE LITTLE RUDOLFINUM: A LITTLE MUSICAL (AND OTHER) FUN

What’s it like to play at the Rudolfinum? Not hide and seek but to play in an orchestra, for example? Which way do the players in the Czech Philharmonic go to get on stage? How noisy can the applause for the conductor get? And what is the word for the magic wand the conductor holds in his hand? Come have some fun with us in various parts of the Rudolfinum.

THE LITTLE RUDOLFINUM: A LAIR FULL OF PERCUSSION

Become apprentice magicians in the percussion kingdom ruled by the wizard Pavel Polívka. Everyone will feel safe there, like in a lair, even in case of thunder, rain, or a stampede of horses.

THE LITTLE RUDOLFINUM: THE VIOLIN MENAGERIE

Does the violin resemble the human body? And does it have a soul? Why are some parts of a violin named for animals? Can you use a violin to go fishing? And what non-musical sounds can be conjured from it? The violinist Libor Vilímec will reveal the answers to these and other question. And we will visit Mr. Slípka’s workshop to the learn the secrets of repairing violins.

STRING SWEETS

We’ll introduce you to the family of string instruments. Dad and Mom – the bass and cello, and the children – violin and viola. And just like any other family, they play together, but sometimes they can also be cross with each other. And they like to eat sweets together. Just come to see and hear the sound of the strings played by the musicians of the Rudolphin Ensemble.

THE ANIMALS AND THE ROBBERS MADE OF BRASS

Do you know that some instruments are made of wood, while others are made of metal? And that the metal ones are called the brass instruments? So how about coming to explore some of them? Come to the Rudolfinum for a fairy tale about animals and robbers accompanied by the Czech Philharmonic Low Brass Ensemble.

A LITTLE TRAIN RIDE WITH DVOŘÁK

The journey can be the destination. Come with us to a chamber concert of Antonín Dvořák’s music. Where are we going? As far as America. How are we travelling? With Dvořák’s favourite means of transport of course. Who is coming with us? The Norbert Quartet – real string music experts.

THE EMPEROR’S NIGHTINGALE OR A VISIT TO THE COURT OF THE EMPEROR OF CHINA

Once upon a time, there was a Chinese emperor who loved toys, technical novelties, machines of all kinds, and mechanical puppets. Then one day he received an unusual gift: a mechanical

nightingale wound up with a key. But can it replace the lovely song of a live nightingale? Come listen and share the experience of Andersen’s fairy tale The Emperor’s Nightingale in a delightful adaptation by the composer Václav Trojan performed by the Trojan Trio.

MARTHA IN THE REALM OF MUSICAL WONDERS

Together with the actress Martha Isoová, we are going to discover the land of wonders – and not only the musical ones. Our new programme – script by Alice Nellis – introduces the music as part of the life, as something, that can be explored, examined and tempted. We will be looking at the orchestra from all sides and discover, how can music help in our lives, where is its power and mainly... the magic. It wouldn’t work without the musicians – looking forward to you is the Prague Baroque Ensemble and its leader Vojtěch Jouza.

THE CZECH PHILHARMONIC APART FROM ITS SEASON AT THE RUDOLFINUM



In accordance with tradition, for its 128th season the Czech Philharmonic is engaged at leading Czech festivals. In Prague, the orchestra will miss neither the Dvořák Prague Festival nor Prague Spring, at the end of the season it will head for Litomyšl, and in November it will support the tradition of the Karlovy Vary Variations for a third time. 26 times in total, the Czech Philharmonic will spread joy abroad, and besides individual trips, there will be tours of Europe and Asia, all led by the orchestra's chief conductor Semyon Bychkov. Presenting themselves with the orchestra abroad will be pianists Katia and Marielle Labèque, Mao Fujita, András Schiff, and Bertrand Chamayou, violinists Gil Shaham and Augustin Hadelich, cellist Pablo Ferrández, and mezzo-soprano Fleur Barron.

The Czech Philharmonic is planning to record and issue new CD titles. Besides Mahler symphonies, they will also focus on Czech compositions as part of preparations for the Year of Czech Music in 2024. The cameras of Czech Phil Media will again be filming key concerts at the Rudolfinum, and live and taped broadcasts will be shown to a wide public at home and around the world by Czech Television and foreign stations and platforms.

At the Dvořák Prague Festival, the Czech Philharmonic will appear on its home stage at the Rudolfinum in three very different programmes conducted by Sakari Oramo, Tomáš Netopil, and Sir András Schiff. Two months later they will join forces with the Karlovy Vary International Film Festival, where they will give two concerts with Tomáš Netopil.

As usual, the season will conclude with concerts at the Prague Spring International Music Festival, where the Czech Philharmonic will appear four times, but it is premature to mention the specific programmes. You will learn about them when the festival presents its entire season. The festival Smetana's Litomyšl will also reveal its exact programme later. The Czech Philharmonic is that festival's partner orchestra, and in 2024, the Year of Czech Music and the 200th anniversary of the birth of Bedřich Smetana, the orchestra is bringing four programmes to Litomyšl led by the principal guest conductors Jakub Hrůša and Tomáš Netopil. As part of the project Smetana 200, which is already underway, there will be Smetana programmes commemorating the Litomyšl native as a great figure of worldwide importance, whose name is inseparably associated with Czech culture.

In accordance with tradition, chief conductor Semyon Bychkov will lead the great majority of concerts at foreign venues, and Manfred Honeck will conduct two concerts in Bucharest. In 2023/24, the Czech Philharmonic will be performing mainly Czech programmes abroad in connection with the Year of Czech Music.

Even before opening the Prague season, the orchestra will go to Bucharest for a festival named after the important Romanian composer George Enescu. It will accompany the pianists Katia and Marielle Labèque. Appearing at the second concert will be the Romanian tenor Cosmin Ifrim and a local choir.

The Covid-19 pandemic brought regular appearances of European orchestras in Asia to a halt. The Czech Philharmonic's last planned tour of Japan and South Korea was cancelled because of it. At the turn of October and November, the orchestra and Semyon Bychkov are finally returning to South Korea and Japan. The last time the Czech Philharmonic appeared in Seoul was in 2017 with the conductor Petr Altrichter. The concerts on the whole tour of Asia will consist exclusively of an all Dvořák programme, and appearing as soloists will be the pianist Mao Fujita, the cellist Pablo Ferrández, and the violinist Gil Shaham. At Tokyo's famed Suntory Hall, the Czech Philharmonic will perform three concerts as the ensemble-in-residence.

The January trip to the German spa town Baden-Baden, the orchestra's first concert there in 25 years, will feature Gustav Mahler's Symphony No. 3. Accompanying the orchestra there will be the women of the Prague Philharmonic Choir and the boys' choir Pueri gaudentes.

A tour in March 2024 will build upon the great success of last season's European tours. There will be guest appearances in famous halls and several residencies: the Czech Philharmonic will give two concerts each at the Auditorio Nacional in Madrid, Vienna's Konzerthaus, Hamburg's

Elbphilharmonie, the Isarphilharmonie in Munich, and the Philharmonie in Paris. There have been several consecutive residencies in Paris, Vienna, and Hamburg, which are indicative of the interest in the quality of the Czech Philharmonic. In addition, there will be individual concerts in Valencia, Barcelona, Erlangen, and Antwerp, all with Semyon Bychkov, cellist Pablo Ferrández, violinist Augustin Hadelich, and pianists Sir András Schiff and Bertrand Chamayou. As part of the Year of Czech Music, there will be performances of three Dvořák concertos, three of his great symphonies, and three overtures.

Season planning also involves concert broadcasts and recording projects, which are among the Czech Philharmonic's main activities. The Pentatone label will release CDs with the third in its series of Gustav Mahler's symphonies and My Country by Bedřich Smetana, both with Semyon Bychkov, and Dvořák's Legends and Slavonic Rhapsodies with Tomáš Netopil. The orchestra is also recording Dvořák's Symphonies Nos. 7, 8, and 9 and his concert overtures, Shostakovich's Leningrad Symphony, and Mahler's Third Symphony with Semyon Bychkov and Josef Suk's Ripening with Jakub Hrůša. Recordings of works by Czech composers will be a component of the projects Year of Czech Music 2024 and Smetana 200.

This season, there will be several recording productions on the orchestra's own Czech Phil Media label. Recordings will be made of the opening concerts, the Concerts for Freedom and Democracy, and a number of subscription concerts. You can watch live broadcasts or taped performances on Czech Television or on foreign

television stations and the VOD platforms Mezzo, Arte, NHK, medici.tv, Takt1, DG Stage+, and Stingray Classica. The material will also be offered exclusively through the distribution company EuroArts, and four exclusive streams of philharmonic concerts will be shown on the VOD platform Symphony.

Traditionally, Czech Television has shown live broadcasts of the New Year's Gala Concert from the Rudolfinum and of the Open Air Concert from Hradčany Square. There will also be continuing collaboration with Czech Radio, which regularly prepares broadcasts of selected Czech Philharmonic concerts. Concerts will also be recorded at domestic festivals and on foreign tours.

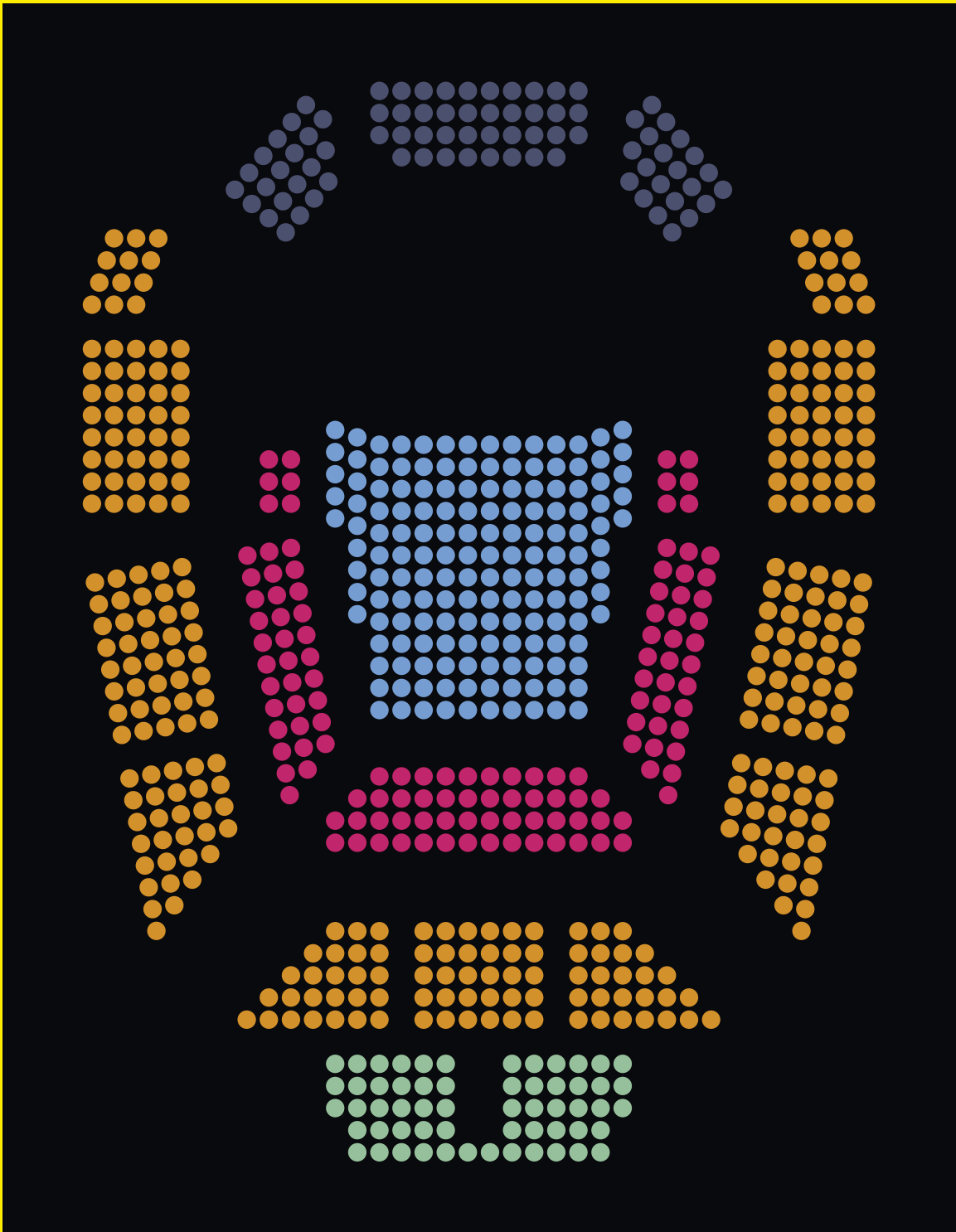

Dear Chamber Music Lovers, Ladies and Gentlemen,

We are now at the threshold of the 129th season of the Czech Chamber Music Society, and our season will be even more festive than usual. Together, we will begin celebrating the Year of Czech Music in 2024. It is probably no surprise that music by Czech composers will be even more plentiful than in previous years, as is appropriate for the most prestigious Czech chamber season.

We are very pleased that after two years of Covid with fewer concerts, we have managed to retain nearly all of the concerts we planned. We believe that again in the coming season, the artists will have the chance to shine before our demanding, educated public.

Awaiting us are the traditional 28 concerts divided into five series. Series I and II have six concerts each at Dvořák Hall, there are four exclusive recitals in Dvořák Hall, six concerts in the early evening series in Suk Hall, and six matinee concerts in Martinů Hall at the Academy of Performing Arts.

Important Czech and foreign artists have enriched our seasons' programming by acting as curators. Following the cellist Clemens Hagen, the violinist Josef Špaček, and the cellist Peter Jarůšek, that role will now be played by Julia Fischer, the superb violinist of Slovak origin. She will be appearing with her own Julia Fischer Quartet and in collaboration with the Czech Philharmonic Chamber Orchestra.

Julia Fischer's solo recital with the pianist Yuliana Avdeeva will also open the recital series. The series brings world-famous artists to the stage of Dvořák Hall. This year you will be hearing piano recitals by Mitsuko Uchida and Víkingur Ólafsson, and the countertenor Jakub Józef Orliński will be appearing in Prague for the first time.

As I pointed out right at the beginning, this year's programming will feature a greatly increased number of works by Czech composers. There will be performances of famous and less familiar works by Bedřich Smetana, Antonín Dvořák, Leoš Janáček, and Bohuslav Martinů. There will also be plenty of music by other Czech composers from the Baroque, Classical, and Romantic eras along with music of the 20th and 21st centuries. The performers will include top Czech groups (the Czech Trio, the Bennewitz Quartet, the Czech Nonet, Collegium Marianum, and the winner of the CCMS Prize, the Belfiatio Quintet) and world-famous ensembles from abroad (Hagen Quartet, Trio Wanderer). Concerts rescheduled from previous cancelled seasons include an appearance by the gamba player Hille Perl and the harpsichordist Mahan Esfahani and a vocal recital by Kateřina Kněžíková.

The pianist Jitka Čechová can boast of having recorded Bedřich Smetana's complete works for piano. You will hear her play seldom-performed works at one of our Early Evening Concerts. Representing the youthful generation is the soprano Lada Bočková, who is establishing herself very quickly on the operatic stage. The Doležal Quartet and the oboist Michaela Hrabánková will present an unusual programme of works by Josef Mysliveček and Vítězslav Novák.

The programming for the popular series of Saturday matinee concerts in Martinů Hall at the Academy of Performing Arts will include compositions for the King of Instruments, the organ. The recital of the organist Pavel Svoboda and the French horn player Kateřina Javůrková has been postponed twice. We hope it will finally take place. You can look forward to the not entirely typical sound of five saxophones presented by the Czech Saxophone Quartet and their guest David Eben. This year, the Czech Philharmonic Winds led by Ondřej Vrabec will present a slightly more intimate programme, and the concert series will conclude with the outstanding cellist Václav Petr and his colleagues from the Czech Philharmonic cello section. You surely have never heard Mussorgsky's Pictures at an Exhibition played this way.

Varied programmes are what a director of programming should concern himself with above all for such a prestigious season, so all listeners can choose what suits their tastes, and so subscribers to one series might want to attend some concerts from a different series. We hope that we have met your expectations and that you will join with us and the artists in enjoying the performances.

Please let me conclude by wishing you, our dear friends, good health. We look forward to seeing you.
